My undergraduate degree was MBChB (European option) at the University of Manchester, studying Medicine with French. I carried out foundation and core medical training in the North West of England, which included an NIHR Academic Clinical Fellowship in Brain Infections. I was then appointed as a permanent Consultant within MMUH to work within the National Isolation Unit, which focuses on prevention and management of High Consequence Infectious Diseases.

Most recently, I was awarded a HRB Clinician Scientist Fellowship working at the early post-doctoral level and focusing on setting up a national clinical diagnostic pathway for imported fever.
